COVID-19 Updates

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update

By the Numbers (Long Beach only | as of 4/16/2020):

- 406 positive results, including 49 people who are hospitalized and approximately 197* cases where people have recovered.
 - The first positive case of a person experiencing homelessness has been confirmed. The individual, an adult male, is currently receiving care at a local hospital and is in stable condition. The individual was not previously connected to the Long Beach service system, and no providers or shelters are believed to have had any recent exposure. The individual was living in his vehicle and is not believed to have had any recent interaction with other persons experiencing homelessness.
 - A Long Beach Airport employee has tested positive for COVID-19. The employee supported airport maintenance in public-facing areas. The employee is in stable condition and is recovering at home in self-isolation.



- The City is only publicly reporting the case numbers associated with Long Beach first responders and employees who are on the frontlines of this pandemic who have daily, significant interactions with community members. Cases involving other City employees will not be publicly reported.
- 95 positive cases have been confirmed at a total of six [long-term care facilities](#) in Long Beach (five facilities currently have active cases, which was the number reported yesterday). These cases include both facility residents and staff members (who may not be Long Beach residents).
- There is a total of 18 fatalities:
 - All had underlying health conditions
 - 13 are associated with long-term care facilities
 - Three individuals were in their 50s, three were in their 60s, two were in their 70s, and 10 were over 80 years old
 - Five individuals were men and 13 were women
 - At this time, to avoid risk to patient privacy, no further details will be provided

*Please note that, for low-risk patients recovering at home, recovery data is self-reported. The City will update this number to the best of its ability, but can only provide an approximate total.

This Week's Highlights:

- Wednesday afternoon the City issued a [new health order](#) requiring long-term care facilities to institute a range of protocols to slow the spread of COVID-19, including a tightening of visitation policies, mandating face coverings and requiring daily temperature screenings for staff and residents. The order applies to facilities serving individuals 65 years and older or those with underlying health conditions.
- On 4/14 the City Council unanimously adopted 25 individual actions related to a historic local [Economic Relief Package](#) designed to help working families and small business owners impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. [Read more.](#)
- The City has been studying the effects of COVID-19 on the population, by ethnicity.
 - The data in the graph below show a disparity in hospitalization rates by race/ethnicity.
 - The City plans to address the disparity as follows:
 - Offer additional free, drive-through testing in neighborhoods with large African American and Hispanic/Latino populations.
 - Better educate the community on the importance of social distancing practices as well as how to effectively social distance and quarantine to limit the spread of COVID-19.
 - Identify isolation sites for those who cannot safely isolate at home.
 - Provide additional support to households in quarantine and isolation.

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

COVID-19 Mental Health Resource



The Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (LACDMH) supports the wellbeing of our County family, friends and colleagues. Street Sweeping Parking Enforcement Suspended Thru May 1st

The suspension of street sweeping parking citations has been extended through May 1, 2020. Street sweeping will continue in areas where the sweeper can effectively provide service, however no citations will be issued to violating vehicles. While citations will not be issued, the City encourages the community to move their vehicles during posted sweeping times. Street sweeping is a critical health service for the City, collecting thousands of tons of debris each year, therefore it is essential that vehicle owners make every effort to comply with parking restrictions. All other parking enforcement, including metered parking, time zones, and red, white and blue curbs, will continue as usual.

Follow Up on Measure A Recount

Last week, we reported that a recount of ballots cast for the March 3rd Long Beach Measure A Election began April 8th. That recount was terminated on April 13th. The provisions of Elections Code 15623 provide a period of 24 hours after the completion or termination of a recount where any other voter may request recount, and that period expired at 5 pm on April 14th. Any further action on Measure A would have to be determined by a court of law. For now, by the terms of the ballot measure, it will be implemented in 2027. There were a total of 22 Los Angeles County cities (one quarter of County total) that had similar sales tax measures on the March 3rd ballot. Next door, the City of Lakewood's Measure L passed by a margin of 64% to 36%. Beginning July 1, 2020, Lakewood's sales tax will increase to 10.25%.



Census 2020 Revised Timelines & Interactive Map

On Monday, the US Census Bureau issued a press release containing updated timelines. Field data collection was suspended in March, but they plan to reactivate field offices beginning June 1st. Also, pending Congressional approval, the window for data collection and self-response will be extended to October 31st. You can read the entire press release at this [link](#).



The Census Bureau has also introduced a tool that enables you to monitor how many people are responding right down to the individual census tract. It is updated daily, and you can access it at this [link](#). As of this morning, the Long Beach self-response was at 50.1%. That is just under the State rate of 50.9%

Western Auto Supply Co. at Anaheim & Temple

Recently, we ran a 1920's photo of the Young & Gresham Ford Dealership at the N/W corner of Anaheim St. and Ohio Ave. That prompted Joe Jost's owner, Ken Buck, to send us a vintage photo of the Western Auto Supply Co. retail store that we're featuring today. It stood at the N/E corner of Anaheim and Temple next to the "prohibition era" Joe Jost's barber shop. The windows of Western Auto advertise tires, accessories, camping equipment, radios, "Serving at a Saving" and "Trade-in your old tires NOW!".

The chain of Western Auto retail stores was started by George Pepperdine who was also the founder of Pepperdine University. Below the vintage photo is a shot we took three years ago of the same storefront at 2801 E. Anaheim St., now home to Brascia Builders. That's Mike Brascia with his crew next to the two-seater Indycar that we took to multiple CD4 businesses. The other vintage shots below the color photo show the Temple side of Western Auto and the interior of the store.
