## Alamitos Bay ‘Swimability’ Improvements Launched

Members of the community joined Vice Mayor Suja Lowenthal, Councilmembers Roberto Uranga and Suzie Price, City Manager Pat West, and staff from the Office of the City Manager, Health and Human Services and Parks, Recreation and Marine to celebrate “swimability” improvements at Alamitos Bay on June 26.

A new, permanent, measured open-water buoy line in Alamitos Bay (that is believed to be the first of its kind in the United States), new swim ladders and water quality signage were unveiled, and were made available for public use. The 500-yard Bay Shore Buoy Line features marked buoys at every 100 yards, starting at the Bay Shore North Restrooms near Second Street and ending slightly east of the Bay Shore Swimming Pier.

Fifteen new swim ladders on public docks will increase

safety and help swimmers get in and out of the water at the popular Alamitos Bay. The swim ladders are located throughout the Bay, including Alamitos Bay Landing, the northeast corner of Naples Island, Mother’s Beach, Davies Launch Ramp, and the Bay Shore Swimming Pier.

New signs will inform swimmers about water quality in the Bay to encourage more activity. The signs are installed at Bay Shore North Restrooms (across from the Bay Shore Neighborhood Library), Bay Shore South (near the Bay Shore Swimming Pier), the Kite Beach parking lot on Ocean Boulevard and Claremont Place, Colorado Lagoon, and Mother’s Beach.

These improvements reaffirm the City’s commitment to “livability” initiatives, including “bikeability” and “walkability,” to promote healthy active lifestyles.



## Long Beach Ranked 37th Best City for Recreation in Nation by WalletHubs



WalletHubs is a social media company that allows people to search for and compare financial products. Wallet Hub also researches and compiles rankings

for businesses, services and products. In time for National Park and Recreation month in July, they released their list of the best cities in the U.S. for recreation.

The website compared the 100 largest U.S. cities by how

they relate to the overall benefits of public spaces and recreational activities across the country. The study evaluated living costs, park quality, the accessibility of entertainment and recreational facilities, and climate.

Long Beach averaged a 37<sup>th</sup> ranking overall, and ranked 45<sup>th</sup> for entertainment and recreational facilities, 77<sup>th</sup> for costs, 36<sup>th</sup> for quality of parks and 12<sup>th</sup> for climate. Other California cities ranked as follows: San Diego, 12; San Francisco, 13 Sacramento, 15, Stockton, 29; Irvine 48 and Oakland 58.

# “Kitty Hall” Cat Adoption Event A Big Success



On July 8, Long Beach City Hall once again became “Kitty Hall” to encourage shelter cat adoptions and promote awareness of Long Beach Animal Care Services (LBACS). The 2016 kitten season has been very busy and the P.D. Pitchford Companion Animal Village has dozens of cats and kittens available for adoption.

LBACS brought 39 cats and kittens to City Hall on July 8 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Within the first 30 minutes, 15 cats were adopted beating last year’s event total of 14. By the end of the event, 38 cats and kittens found new homes. A resident contacted LBACS and adopted the 39th cat at the LBACS Pet Food Express location the following day, ensuring that all 39 cats in attendance at the event found new homes. LBACS staff answered questions about cat ownership and accepted adoption applications. Spay and neuter vouchers, a discounted adoption rate of \$20 and other promotions were available.

## Long Beach Animal Care Services Mid-Year Snapshot

The year 2016 has been a great year for the Long Beach Animal Care Services Bureau’s (LBACS) efforts to save animals. The 2016 year-to-date statistics are the best ever reported for the first six months of any year, and show increasing progress being made at the animal shelter in 2016, compared to the first six months in 2015:

- A **15 percent reduction** in the number of cats and dogs impounded at the shelter, from 3,783 to 3,219.
- A **37 percent reduction** in the number of cats and dogs euthanized, from 1,156 to 725.
- **Live Release Rates** of 89 percent for dogs and 63 percent for cats, compared to 85 percent and 54 percent, respectively. (The Live Release Rate is the percentage of animals returned to owners, adopted or transferred to a rescue group.)

Long Beach ACS continues to look for new partnerships, programs and innovative ways to help save lives, such as their smartphone App to increase adoptions and the Twitter feed #LBLostFoundPets help reunite lost pets with their owners. With the help of the community and hard-working staff, ACS looks forward to reaching more milestones in the future.

# Groundbreaking Ceremony Held For Downtown Fitness Loop



A groundbreaking ceremony for the new Downtown Fitness Loop was held on July 9 near the Shoreline Marina Office. Guests saw the first installed piece of fitness equipment, as well as plans for the entire loop.

“This enhancement to the Downtown area complements the beach pedestrian path and Bixby Park Fitness Loop,” said Vice Mayor Suja Lowenthal at the event. “The more we provide convenient access to fitness equipment in public space, the more we improve health and wellness within our community.”

The Downtown Fitness Loop is a 4.8-mile walking/running path bordered by Ocean Boulevard, East and West Shoreline Drive, Aquarium Road and Golden Shore. The loop has distance markers that connect fitness equipment stations, allowing exercisers to develop a routine suited for their fitness level. Throughout the path, five active stations such as pull-up/dip bars, and six passive stations such as balance stretch and squats will be positioned.

The Downtown Fitness Loop will be the eighth free Fitness Loop in Long Beach. Free outdoor fitness loops are also available at Admiral Kidd, Houghton, Coolidge, Orizaba, Bixby, Chavez and 14th Street Parks.

## Beach Replenishment and Sand Berm Maintenance Underway

The Marine Bureau’s Beach Maintenance Division is vigilant in their efforts to protect the low lying Peninsula area of Long Beach from the effects of storms and hurricanes that develop in the Pacific Ocean from May through November. Staff monitors weather charts to plan at least three weeks ahead of storms, which while happening hundreds of miles away, still send swells to Long Beach that erode the beach and that can cause possible flooding.

The east end of the City’s ocean beach is most heavily impacted by Pacific storms that cause erosion. Using two trucks with a 35-yard capacity payload, staff move sand from the west beach, where sand naturally builds up to the east beach to maintain its normal width.

During this time, staff constantly monitors and repairs sand berms to protect homes from tidal flooding.

Staff limits the impact of their work on the community by restricting their hours of operation to 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

They also construct sand berms as far away from homes as practical and attempt to keep the berms high enough to be effective, yet low enough to provide a view.

# Know Your Long Beach Parks: Fellowship Park



Fellowship Park, at Willow and Pasadena Avenue, opened to the public on June 22, 2004.

The .46-acre park furthered Parks, Recreation and Marine's

Open Space Plan goal to create additional acreage for parks. The neighborhood surrounding Fellowship Park is one that lacks sufficient open space and recreational areas.

This park, along a portion of the old Pacific Electric Right-of-Way, was created as a condition of approval of the adjacent self-storage project. The developer funded and constructed the park and deeded this portion of the property to the City of Long Beach for park purposes.

The park improvements included open turf areas, a tot lot, lighting, picnic tables, benches and parking. Participants at the Veterans Park Day Camp held a contest to choose the park name.

# Maintenance and Development Bureau Update

## LBPRM Irrigation Improvements



Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine (LBPRM) is committed to effectively using limited water resources to maintain healthy and safe recreational open space for residents.

On June 16, 2016, the Long Beach Board of Water Commissioners approved a Water Efficiency Cooperation Memorandum of Understanding with

LBPRM to allow the Department to have more flexibility in their watering schedule, while maintaining their current water allocation. LBPRM will be allowed to irrigate on days outside the regular residential and business watering schedule of Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. LBPRM is not mandated to water three days per week. It is important to note that Department can water on more days and times up to their budget amount.

An example of the flexible schedule would be not watering on Saturdays, to avoid disturbing the public's enjoyment and use of the parks. Being able to vary the watering schedule will also reduce stress on LBPRM's antiquated irrigation system and result in fewer pipeline breaks.

In order to maintain its current volume of water use, LBPRM will reduce watering in some less-utilized areas of the parks and concentrate more watering on higher-priority areas such as trees, playing fields, and recreation and picnic areas. LBPRM is also updating their infrastructure with newer irrigation technology, planting drought tolerant landscapes in strategic spaces and eventually, using more reclaimed water. Per the California Governor's mandate, LBPRM is not irrigating turf medians with potable water.

The goal of the collaboration between LBPRM and Long Beach Water is more efficient water usage in the parks and lakes, and reduced water irrigation system maintenance costs.

# Tennis Program Update



The first week of the Junior Summer Tennis Camps at Billie Jean King and El Dorado Park Tennis Centers started strongly with many youth playing tennis for the first time. The camps began June 20 and run weekly through August 28.

The United States Tennis Association (USTA) league began in June. The USTA league is a competitive recreational adult tennis league that helps players be a part of a team, get on the court, make new tennis friends and travel to other tennis facilities. Many adult patrons participate in this highly competitive weekend league which consists of doubles and mixed doubles. The competition is exciting, the atmosphere is social and since players compete as teams, there is a built in cheering section.

On June 24, El Dorado Park Tennis Center hosted their Summer Kick-Off Party, Barbecue and Wilson Worldwide Demo Tour. More than 75 attendees enjoyed an evening of music, tasty barbecue provided by Legends Sports Bar, a chance to all work on their game with USTA pros and to try out 2016 Wilson racquets and shoes.

The summer includes Long Beach Tennis' busy SCTA tournament schedule. El Dorado Park Tennis Center hosts these large junior tournaments which included the USTA Girl's 16 National Warm-Up Tournament on July 3, and the upcoming USTA Junior Open for boys and girls, ages 10 to 18 on August 8, and the 32nd Annual Junior Satellite on August 20. The National Warm-Up is a prestigious tournament for young players who travel to Long Beach from across the nation, to represent the future of the sport and who want to take their game to the next level.

Summer tennis classes offered through Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine are attracting many first time participants. These popular classes are taught by our USTA certified tennis pros in Long Beach parks, with the majority of them held at El Dorado Park West.

The Long Beach Tennis pros were active this past school year visiting LBUSD elementary and middle schools during Physical Education classes to teach tennis, and build participation in tennis programs. This effort has resulted in more families inquiring about programs.

Long Beach Tennis teamed up with the Southern California Tennis Association (SCTA) to offer three free tennis clinics and "FUN" tennis play days in June. The SCTA reached out to families who lived within a 10-mile radius of El Dorado Park Tennis Center who have never played. More than 60 people attended each free "FUN" program and enjoyed the on-court instruction, pizza and prizes.

Long Beach Tennis continues to offer special events and programming for juniors and adults at Billie Jean King and El Dorado Park Tennis Centers and is looking forward to a summer filled with fun for all our patrons.
