After 20+ Years in the Making - DeForest Wetlands Opens to the Public

The community joined Mayor Robert Garcia, Vice Mayor Rex Richardson, Eighth District Councilmember Al Austin and the Departments of Parks, Recreation and Marine and Public Works at the grand opening ceremony of the DeForest Wetlands on Saturday, June 30.

“This project will create recreational opportunities and open space in under-served neighborhoods and further efforts to restore the Los Angeles River,” said Mayor Robert Garcia.

The DeForest Wetlands opened 34 acres for public use by converting areas of overgrown vegetation and land devoid of habitat into a river parkway with freshwater wetlands, wildlife habitat, recreational trails, native plants, and interpretive signage, while retaining flood control properties. Public use includes bird watching, walking, horseback riding, and educational tours and programs.

“Restoring DeForest Wetlands is part of the renaissance in North Long Beach,” said Vice Mayor Rex Richardson. “This site allows families to enjoy nature in our community.”

“The DeForest Wetlands is a destination for residents and anyone looking for a great place to take a stroll and enjoy a bit of nature in our city,” said Councilmember Al Austin.

The total project cost was approximately \$8.5 million, and was made possible using funds from Los Angeles County Proposition A, the California Resources Agency, California Coastal Conservancy, and the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy.



Walking, biking and equestrian trails; vernal pools, and habitat including native grasslands, coastal shrubs and oak-sycamore trees were developed or enhanced.

Bayshore Beach Improvements Ready For Summer



On June 16, the City of Long Beach unveiled shoreline improvements in the Bayshore area.

“These are amazing improvements and they couldn’t have come at a better time as we are getting ready for summer,” said Mayor Robert Garcia. “This revitalized area will provide countless hours of fun for Long Beach residents and visitors.”

The Bayshore revitalization efforts included:

- ◆ A complete rebuild of the Leeway Pier and repairs to the foundation and aesthetics of the Leeway Sailing Center.
- ◆ New paint and other aesthetic enhancements to the Bayshore Concessions Stand.
- ◆ The addition of free, public lockers for beach-goers.
- ◆ The rebuild of the swim dock and pier, with the addition of water features to the swim dock such as water guns and a drinking fountain.
- ◆ The installation of a large aquatic playground near the swim dock, providing swimmers with the opportunity to climb, slide and jump into the water.

“The Bayshore area offers basketball, handball, swimming, kayaking, paddle boarding, gondola rides, and now the new aquatic playground,” said Councilwoman Suzie Price. “I look forward to seeing families out together in Bayshore enjoying this upgraded shoreline space.”

The completion of the Leeway Pier and Bayshore area improvements comes as Heal the Bay released its most recent water quality report in June giving the Bayshore area an A+ water quality rating.

“Swimability in Long Beach has never been better. Our City has made many improvements along the shoreline to increase usability of our city’s beaches and waterways,” said City Manager Pat West.

In the coming years, more improvements will be made to the surrounding area including reconstruction of the existing Bayshore Lifeguard Station. The City is also working with Los Angeles County to relocate the storm drain pipes underground that separate Leeway Pier from the Bayshore swim dock.



Be SAFE Programs Activating Parks This Summer

The “Be SAFE” (Summer Activities in a Friendly Environment) program supports neighborhoods by extending supervision hours at designated parks during the evening and employing neighborhood youth. Be SAFE offers arts and crafts, outdoor games, sports, science activities, dance programs, classes in fitness, cooking, gardening and flower arranging; and computer labs that appeal to youth and families. By keeping selected parks activated in the evening hours, residents have many options for recreation and spending time together. The program began on June 18 and will be offered Monday through Friday from 5 to 8 p.m. through August 24. PRM Staff Support Residents Displaced Due to Tragedy

On June 25, PRM staff in partnership with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the Red Cross opened a shelter at Silverado Park for residents displaced during the investigation of a shooting at the Covenant Manor in Downtown Long Beach, in which Long Beach Fire Captain David Rosa, was killed and two others injured.

Maintenance Operations and Community Recreation Services staff mobilized cots, tables, hygiene kits, water, tables, and emergency supplies at the Silverado Park Gymnasium. The Red Cross support included arranging for food service. Mental health and nursing staff from HSS were available and the Long Beach Police Department provided security. Long Beach Animal Care Services staff helped the evacuated seniors care for their pets.

Summer Food Program Serving Youth Throughout the City



For the 39th year in a row, Parks, Recreation and Marine (PRM) is offering the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) for children and youth. The SFSP continues the free lunch programs offered during the school year by Long Beach Unified School District, and

can make the summer school break a healthy and fun experience.

“The Summer Food Service Program helps to ensure that children continue to receive nutritious meals when school is not in session,” said Mayor Robert Garcia. “Thanks to the staff at Parks, Recreation and Marine, our youth will be served at 29 locations throughout Long Beach.”

The SFSP began on June 18 and will be offered through August 17, 2018. Free meals will be available to all attending children and youth who are one to 18-years-old. Infant meals will not be served. Program locations, hours and menus are available at: www.longbeach.gov/park/recreation-programs/programs-and-classes/youth-and-teen-programs/usda-summer-food-program.

The USDA began the SFSP to fill the nutrition gap for children from low-income areas. Many children who qualify

for free and reduced-price meals during the regular school year typically do not have access to these meals during school breaks. However, through the SFSP, children in an eligible area can go to their school, a park, or another approved SFSP site, and receive free lunches during their school break.

When coupled with a physical and/or academic activity, serving sites can also provide children with a safe and supervised learning environment. Even without an organized activity, children can still benefit from the opportunity to meet with friends or make new ones under responsible adult supervision.

Marine Bureau Boat Auction

The Marine Bureau held a boat auction at the Alamitos Bay Marina on June 9 to sell impounded and abandoned vessels that included kayaks, paddle boards, inflatables and boat equipment and accessories. More than 200 eager seafarers arrived at 8 a.m. to inspect the vessels before the auction began at 9 a.m. as all items were offered “as is - where is.” The auction netted \$23,022. The most expansive boat sold for \$9,000 and the biggest boat sold was a 50’ sailboat.
