2B. Experience of Applicant, Subrecipient(s), and Other Partners

1. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in effectively utilizing federal funds and performing the activities proposed in the application.

The City of Long Beach Department of Health and Human Services Homeless Services Bureau (HSB) has been administering federally funded homelessness programs since 1995 and currently manages a portfolio of over \$75 million in funding. The City of Long Beach administers its own Continuum of Care (CoC) and has been designated as both the Administrative Entity and Lead Agency. In addition to receiving the federal CoC Program grant, the HSB administers the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), CDBG funds, HOME, and more recently, funding through HOME-ARP and ESG CARES. These federal grant programs support the City of Long Beach’s overall system of care for people experiencing homelessness by funding activities including homelessness prevention, permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing, transitional housing, street outreach, performance management, emergency shelter, and coordinated entry. As its own CoC, Long Beach operates its own Coordinated Entry System that ensures participant confidentiality and rapid connection to housing resources. Through the CES, the Long Beach CoC is able to effectively screen and assess participants to refer them to relevant services to achieve the ultimate goal of permanent housing.

The City currently subcontracts with a victim service provider to deliver homelessness prevention and rapid rehousing services specifically tailored for DV survivors. In addition, the CoC established a systemwide policy that requires all funded permanent housing projects, transitional housing projects, and homelessness prevention programs that provide short- and or medium-term rental assistance, to establish procedures and protections for persons experiencing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking in accordance with the requirements set forth in 24 CFR part 5, subpart L, which implemented the requirements of the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act (VAWA) of 2013. All agencies that engage with the CoC are required to sign and adhere to the Long Beach CoC Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Protections, Procedures, & Policy, which stipulates conditions regarding notification requirements; contract, lease, and occupancy agreement provisions; emergency transfer plan; protections available to persons experiencing domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking; and confidentiality.

2. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in leveraging Federal, State, local and private sector funds.

Funding for homeless services has grown exponentially over the last several years. To date, Federal, State, and local funding agencies have invested resources into the City of Long Beach so that the issue of homelessness can be

addressed at multiple levels. Currently, the Homeless Services Bureau’s annual budget is approximately \$75 million, which is comprised of allocations from the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) grant; California Emergency Solutions and Housing (CESH) grant; State’s Roomkey and Homekey programs; Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG); Mayor’s Fund to End Homelessness; and several other new grant funding. Ninety-eight percent of HSB’s total budget comes from grant funds. Given the complexity of the distinct funding sources and the specific regulations and policies that must be followed to achieve compliance, the City has become very well versed in knowing what is mandated by funding agencies and how to best utilize funding to achieve housing for all, while effectively certifying that each activity is eligible within their respective funding sources. In addition, as the only HUD-designated Unified Funding Agency (UFA) in California, the City of Long Beach has demonstrated strong financial management systems to administer the subcontracting, accounting, monitoring, performance, and reporting practices for the array of CoC and ESG funded programs. Adherence to granting agencies’ regulations is of utmost importance, and the City has been effective in operating various funding to continue to address the basic needs of people experiencing homelessness, while also using the funding to pilot innovative programs.

3. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) financial management structure.

The City of Long Beach Department of Health and Humans Services has an Administrative and Operations Bureau that manages all finance-related aspects of the department. This includes budgeting and accounting oversight, in addition to business operations and invoicing procedures. This Bureau employs a Bureau Manager, Financial Services Officer, and a Grants and Contracts Management Officer. Together, these positions supervise employees that direct all accounting and grant management functions across the department. The Homeless Services Bureau also has an administrative division consisting of 17 full-time employees that are dedicated to effectively administering grants, including the financial management components of these grants, while ensuring grantor compliance and the correct implementation of accounting based principles stipulated in 2 CFR Part 200 – Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards. Further, the City of Long Beach has its own Department of Financial Management to guarantee overall financial integrity and compliance with federal, state, and local funders. Lastly, these practices are institutionalized across the organization through written policies and procedures that guide the City’s financial management operations.

The Domestic Violence (DV) Coordinated Entry project will incorporate additional screening and resource coordination for households that meet Category 4 of the HEARTH homelessness definition, which includes survivors who are fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking, or human trafficking. This project will leverage the existing Coordinated Entry System (CES) and the array of SSO projects currently funded in the CoC to navigate DV survivors to housing resources while protecting their safety and confidentiality. Additionally, the City will have a staff dedicated to supporting the screening, matching, and coordinating efforts for households who are survivors of domestic violence. The CES lead staff will also be responsible for leading efforts for implementing a coordinated screening and assessment effort for all DV households being served to best prioritize households for available housing interventions. Staff will conduct regular case conferencing and coordination meetings that bring victim service providers together to discuss the service and resource needs for the households they are serving and how the system can work together to meet those needs, while finetuning improvements to the process and assuring all requirements in the Long Beach Violence Against Women Act Protections, Procedures, and Policy are met.

4c. Describe the advertisement strategy for the coordinated entry process and how it is designed to reach those with the highest barriers to accessing assistance.

The DV Coordinated Entry project will collaborate with local victim service providers that operate within the City of Long Beach region to focus marketing strategies to DV survivors and those who potentially meet Category 4 of HUD's homelessness definition. Marketing activities will include regular meetings with victim service providers to discuss housing resources and system flow improvements. Additionally, the City will ensure that a DV component is integrated into the overall Coordinated Entry System (CES) assessment process and DV-specific services are incorporated in the comprehensive provision of resources provided in CoC. This will ensure that outreach workers and case managers operating in all of the City's supportive services-only projects are screening persons coming in for current and past histories of DV and properly linking them through a tailored DV Coordinated Entry process to appropriate housing and supportive resources, which ensuring the protections established in the CoC Violence Against Women Act Protections, Procedures, and Policy.

In addition, the CoC utilizes a multi-pronged marketing strategy to help ensure fair and equal access to the CES which include the following:

- **Pocket Guide:** the City maintains a Pocket Guide in 4 languages (English, Spanish, Tagalog, and Khmer), which provides information on the CES and other resources for households in or at-risk of housing crisis. The Pocket Guides are distributed by the Street Outreach Network and other organizations throughout the community (e.g., libraries, homeless services providers, churches, social services providers). The City is currently in the process of developing a digital resource directory that will be available on the City website to further connect residents to the CES.
- **Street Outreach Network:** a multi-disciplinary team comprised of cross-departmental City staff, including Quality of Life police officers, Firefighter-Paramedics, mental health clinicians, and other partners from community-based organizations with expertise in mental health, veterans, chronically homeless, and substance use addiction. Daily outreach takes place throughout the city, including river beds, beaches, parks, businesses, underpasses, and public spaces to individuals with the highest barriers to accessing assistance. These street outreach teams provide mobile assessment and linkage to the CES.
- **Multi-lingual and Translation Services:** CES agencies have qualified bilingual staff to be able to engage with monolingual populations. The City contracts with Language Access to provide translation services for in-person communication and written materials. Basic translation of the CoC website is available in Spanish, Khmer, and Tagalog. Translation for written materials in other languages is made available upon request through the City's Language Access Program.
- **Multiple access locations:** the Long Beach CoC has two primary CES hubs: the Multi-Service Center and the Homeless Assistance Program, which are both accessible by public transportation. In addition, agencies provide transportation services including vans and public transportation resources such as rideshare vouchers and metro/bus transit passes.
- **Affirmative Marketing Plan:** the City has budgeted funds from the State to develop and deploy an affirmative marketing plan to connect hard-to-reach populations to the CES, ensuring outreach to those least likely to access services on their own.
- **Information and Referral:** Outreach and education to faith-based organizations, CBOs, food programs, and drop-in centers also provide referrals to help reach all unsheltered people.

4e. Describe the standardized assessment and referral process that directs individuals and families to appropriate housing and services.

The Multi-Service Center (MSC) and Homeless Assistance Program (HAP) currently serve as the primary CES access hubs for the CoC. Agencies co-located at the MSC provide integrated, centralized assessment and comprehensive services for at-risk and homeless households in order to streamline service delivery, minimize barriers to obtaining and maintaining permanent housing, and ultimately reduce the length of homelessness

experienced by individuals and families. Participants are typically connected to the CES via the Street Outreach Network, which is a multi-disciplinary and cross-departmental team that engages chronically and unsheltered homeless individuals using a human-centered and trauma-informed approach to reach people where they are at in order to get them connected to services within the system. The CES monitors vacancies in RRH and PSH projects and prioritizes referrals based on program-specific subpopulations such as family households with prioritization given to chronically homeless households and/or severity of need. Households are placed on the Housing Opportunity Pool and prioritized for housing resources based on the results of their assessments. Co-location of RRH and PSH partner agencies at these CES hubs helps to streamline intake and referral processes into available program vacancies. These processes are detailed in the City's CES policies and procedures, which are annually reviewed and approved by the CoC Board. The following describes other components of the CES process pertinent to connecting people to appropriate housing resources:

- Connection to Available Resources: Agencies co-located at the MSC provide the following resources: prevention/diversion services, housing placement, case management, retention services, employment services, financial assistance, linkage to mainstream benefits, medical/health screenings and services, HIV/AIDS related services, substance use, crisis counseling, and mental health referrals, vet specific services, childcare, and coordination with the local school district. HAP provides triage and assessment of individuals for seamless coordination of services including psychiatric assessment, medication dispensary, SSI payee, and linkage to a portfolio of CoC and non-CoC funded supportive services and housing. The CoC also provides participants with access to SSI/SSDI TA through the local SOAR initiative led by Help Me Help You, a partner co-located at the MSC. Across the entire CoC umbrella of programs, staff utilizes evidence-based practices including Housing First, harm reduction, trauma-informed care, and progressive engagement strategies, such as motivational interviewing, to establish individualized housing and service plan goals with participants.

- Uniform Decision Making including Participant Choice: Upon entry into the CES, households are triaged and assessed for income eligibility, access to mainstream benefits, and level of assistance needed using a standardized assessment tool (VI-SPDAT) and Standardized Housing Assessment. Staff utilizes a collaborative decision-making process informed by participants' choices to develop a case plan that informs the targeting of services moving forward. Service plans may include referrals to projects receiving ESG, CoC, and non-CoC program funds. CES staff coordinate closely with the other CoC projects to ensure a successful warm hand-off.

- DV Screening: Currently, the City has created an assessment and screening tool that is being utilized by victim service providers to provide referrals for Emergency Housing Vouchers. The program will go through a process of receiving further input and guidance from the DV providers in Long Beach to finalize an assessment process that will be utilized by all DV providers that are accessing resources through the Coordinated Entry System. The tool will enable prioritization for DV survivors of critical housing and supportive resources including transitional housing, rapid rehousing, and permanent supportive housing.
