

FROM THE MANAGER

It's hard to believe fall is just around the corner, kids are going back to school and we're already celebrating Labor Day. Hope you had an enjoyable summer on the water taking advantage of all that the city and our marinas have to offer.

September brings the Lobster Festival, Belmont Shore Car Show and The Long Beach Tri-athlon to our shores, find out more information about road closures, parking and how they might affect you on the day of event.

Anxious to get back to school? The Coast Guard Auxilliary is offering two classes this month to enhance your boating and sailing skills and keep you safe out on the water.

The primary topic this month is the slip fee increase. As I have reported in the past, as a result of the sale of the Marina Revenue Bonds, Series 2015 for \$114 million dollars, The City has pledged the marinas net revenues as payment for the debt and we are legally bound to maintaining at least 1.25 times the debt service coverage. This means our annual revenue must grow at a rate of 2% per year, which translates into slip fee increases.

With the City Council approved budget our slip increase will be 2% for concrete docks and 1.5% for wood docks.

The fee increase will be reflected on your October billing statement. The October bill will be slightly higher due to the increase in your security deposit, which must equal one month's slip rent. The proposed fees are as follows:

This is a large event with great impact to our residents and visitors, so please plan ahead – especially boaters in the Long Beach Shoreline Marina. - On Saturday, October 8th, from 7:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 9th, Shoreline Drive, from Ocean to Linden, will be closed and the ONLY access into and out of the LBSM will be from Pine Avenue to Shoreline Drive to Shoreline Village Drive.
- On Saturday, October 8th, from 7:30 a.m. until 12 noon there will be a Kids Fun Run and 5K near the Aquarium of the Pacific.
- On Sunday, October 9th, from 12:01a.m. until 11:00 a.m. vehicle ingress and egress to the LBSM will be prohibited.

If you need to use your vehicle to leave the marina between these hours, you will need to park in the Convention Center Lot. (Using the service road entry near the back loading dock). Make sure your LBSM parking pass is visible. You will be permitted to cross the course on foot at any time during the event.

2016 Coastal Clean Up Day IN LONG BEACH

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 2016

WHAT IS COASTAL CLEANUP DAY?

Every year, on the third Saturday in September, people join together at sites all over California to take part in the State's largest volunteer event, California Coastal Cleanup Day. In 2015, nearly 68,000 volunteers removed more than 1,143,000 pounds of trash and recyclables from California's beaches, lakes, and waterways. Families, friends, coworkers, scout troops, school groups, service clubs, and individuals come together to celebrate and share their appreciation of California's fabulous coast and waterways. The event is part of the International Coastal Cleanup, organized by the Ocean Conservancy, which is the largest volunteer event on the planet!

WHY ARE BEACH CLEANUPS IMPORTANT?

Vast amounts of plastic debris litter the world's oceans causing all manner of harm, and most of this debris comes from land. Our beaches are collecting spots for trash from city

streets and highways. Trash travels via inland waterways, storm drains, sewers, and on the wind, and eventually ends up on the coast. If not removed, this debris will end up in the ocean. Beach cleanups are a last line of defense - to prevent debris from

causing harm to our oceans, wildlife, coastal economies, and even to beach-goers (ouch!).

WHAT IS MARINE DEBRIS?

Marine debris is defined as "any manufactured or processed solid waste material that enters the marine environment from any source." Debris is everywhere—found around every major body of water on the planet, and below water as well. Marine debris is a global pollution problem that impacts human health and safety, endangers wildlife and aquatic habitats, and costs local and national economies millions in wasted resources and lost revenues.

Many people assume that if trash exists in the ocean, it must be that the fishing and shipping industries are to blame. But in fact, only 20% of the items found in the ocean can be linked to ocean-based sources, like commercial fishing vessels, cargo ships (discharge of containers and garbage), or pleasure cruise ships. The remainder (80%) is due to land-based sources, like litter (from pedestrians, motorists, beach visitors), industrial discharges (in the form of plastic pellets and powders), and garbage management (ill-fitting trash can lids, etc) trashing California's beaches.

A 2001 study found an average of 334,271 pieces of plastic per square mile in the North Pacific Central Gyre, which serves as a natural eddy system to concentrate material. A 2009 voyage to that same region found plastic particles in over 100 consecutive surface tows over approximately 8 days of sampling. And debris in the marine environment means hazards for animals and humans. Marine debris affects at least 663 species worldwide, including all known sea turtle species and about half of all of marine mammal species. More than 80% of these impacts were associated with plastic debris.

2016 COASTAL CLEANUP DAY IN LONG BEACH

The El Dorado Nature Center is partnering with the California Coastal Commission to coordinate seven cleanup sites in Long Beach. Joining us as site captains are the Aquarium of the Pacific, Seal Beach Yacht Club, Long Beach Marine Institute, Friends of Colorado Lagoon, Clean LB, the Long Beach Health Department, and the Long Beach Water Department.

Participating is easy - all you have to do is show up at any of our sites and sign in! Saturday, September 17 2016, from 9 AM – noon at any of the following locations:
